Missionary Facts:

- 18 missionary families or units residing or working in 29 countries/ministries
- 32 nations
- 6,800+ churches and preaching points
- 494,800+ constituents

The Central America / Caribbean / Mexico (CAC) region begins at the southern border of the United States (Mexico), extends south to Panama (just north of South America), and encompasses the islands of the Caribbean as well as three countries in South America. Thirty-two nations have a population of over 205,000,000, speaking five primary languages: English, Spanish, French, Creole, and Dutch.

Key Project:

The CAC region is made up of three sub-regions. Each sub-region celebrates one major conference each year. These conferences are designed to minister to the pastors and their spouses with preaching, fellowship, and training. A special camp for pastor's children is provided at each conference as well. The children enjoy fun and friendships as well as teaching and training. These conferences have proven to be a great blessing to all who attend, but they do need assistance with expenses. Consider taking a special offering to help this region with their conference expenses and allow more families to attend.

The CAC region is a bright and colorful region where people love to party. Host a party with a Latin flavor, complete with pinatas, music, and traditional food. Search the Internet for recipes from the region, and provide a variety of foods. Not all the islands are Spanish speaking, so bring in some Jamaican and British foods as well. Encourage everyone to dress in bright colors. Play music from the region.

It is important to get as many items donated as possible, from food to prizes to props. Ask party stores for donations (especially piñatas, which can be expensive). There are several ways to raise funds. Sell tickets to attend. Charge for each piñata hit. Set a large collection jar on a table in the center and ask the people to fill it. Print cards with dollar amounts, ask attendees to

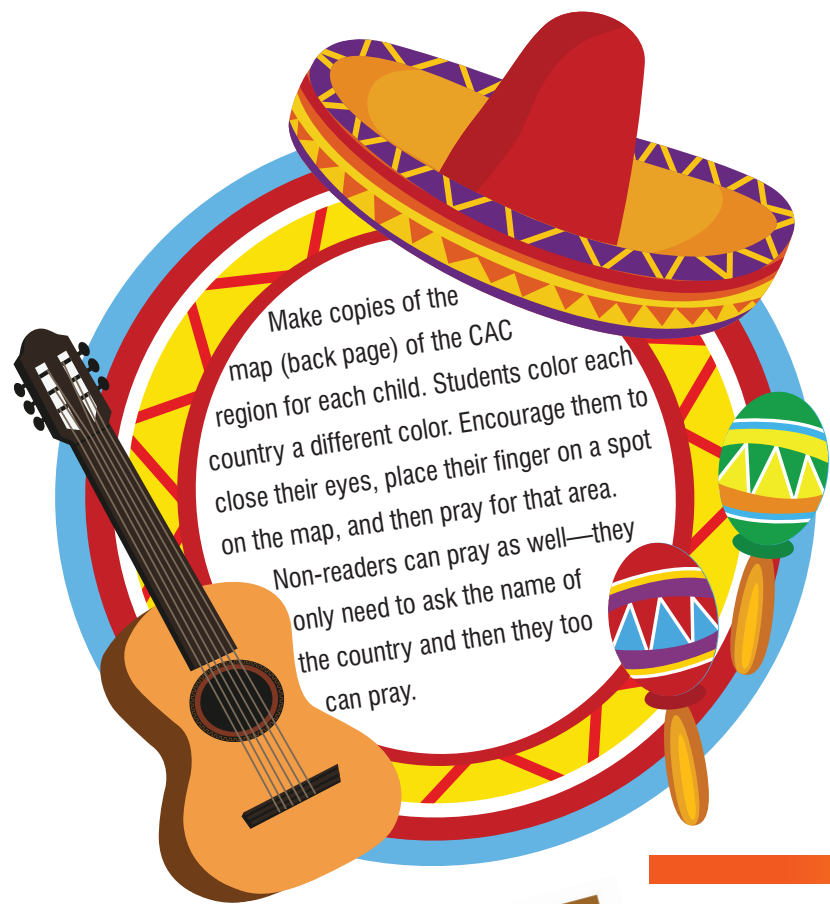
draw a card, and then they pay the amount on the card (set a deadline for payment so they do not have to pay the day of the party).

Have fun as you help this region support their conferences and the families who attend.

Upon completion of your fundraising, write a church check for the amount and send it to Global Missions, 8855 Dunn Road, Hazelwood, MO 63042. Be sure to include the project account number below so the funds are disbursed to the correct account. Let the children make and sign a card to send with the check. It will go to the regional director, who will be sure to share it at the conferences.

PRAY FOR:

- Protection for the missionaries—the national workers, and the church. The area is troubled with political unrest, gang violence, rebel armies, and the threat of hurricanes and damaging weather.
- Financial aid—for printing tracts, building churches, buying Bibles, building Bible schools and support for our missionaries.
- Doors to open to the gospel—superstition, witchcraft, and voodoo present challenges, but God will overcome!
- Good health and strength for the missionaries—travel into rain forests and deep into the jungles, and meetings in unsanitary buildings carry the threat of disease, not to mention the heavy workload the missionaries must carry to meet the needs of widespread churches.
- Language interpreters for the missionaries—also pray for the missionaries as they learn the language.
- Revival—to flourish in Central America, Mexico, and the Caribbean islands.
- Sunday School Teacher Training—this time of training teachers is important as they will go home better equipped to teach. Pray for safe travels, for the teachers who come to learn, and for the leaders who train the teachers.



SPECIAL FOCUS:

The United Pentecostal Church is helping to build an orphanage in Guatemala! There are over 370,000 orphans in Guatemala alone. In 2011, H.O.M.E. International became registered with the Guatemalan government. Since then, they have purchased land and have begun the building process. They hope to one day serve one hundred orphans with love and care while teaching them about Jesus.

Missionary Lynne Jewett is the president of the orphanage with help from missionary Brad Thompson, Aimer Amber Corey as director, and many nationals. Nicaragua uses the steam from the depths of its many volcanoes for geothermal energy.

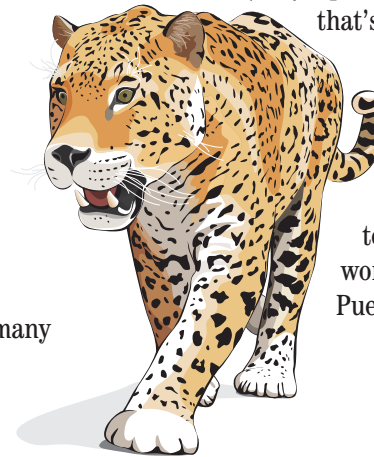
Nicaragua is home to jaguars, sloths, toucans, boa constrictors, monkeys, wild boars, and sea turtles.
